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




We invite you to visit the Principality of Andorra, the smallest state in Europe in the heart of the Pyrenees.

Official language

Catalan is the official language of Andorra. However, due to the diversity of nationalities among the resident population, other languages such as Spanish, French and Portuguese are also very widespread.

Administrative organisation

The territory is structured into seven local administrative divisions known as parishes: Canillo, Encamp, Ordino, la Massana, Andorra la Vella, Sant Julià de Lòria and Escaldes-Engordany. They are represented and managed by the town halls (comuns).

Religion

Catholicism is the main religion of the state, although the Constitution of Andorra establishes freedom of religion.

Political system

Parliamentary co-principality. The only country in the world with two heads of state, a special feature resulting from the mediaeval document known as Pariatges and the historical evolution of the country.

The co-princes, the Bishop of Urgell and the president of the French Republic, represent the people of Andorra jointly and indivisibly, personally and exclusively. At the present time they are his Excellency Mr. Joan Enric Vives i Sicília and his Excellency Mr. Nicolas Sarkozy.

On 14th March 1993, the first written constitution of Andorra was signed and the Principality became a democratic, social state in law.

The General Council (Consell General) exercises the legislative powers and its members, the councillors, are chosen by universal suffrage for four years.

Economy

Trade and tourism (60%) and finance (16%) are the three motors behind the economy and, at the same time, the sectors which generate most jobs.


Agriculture and stock-breeding, the two axes of the traditional economy until the arrival of tourism in the 1960s, now only account for 0.36% of the paid population.

10.500 - 700 bC - From prehistoric times to the pre-Roman period: first inhabitants of the territory of Andorra as in La Balma de La Margineda, El Cedre in Santa Coloma or l'Antuix in Escaldes-Engordany.

805 - The legend says that Charlemagne founded Andorra in recognition for the help given by its inhabitants against Saracens.

Mid-9th century - Consecration of the cathedral of Santa Maria d'Urgell, the first document which mentions the parishes of Andorra as lands of the counts of Urgell.

1133 - The count of Urgell gives the Bishop of Urgell the rights he had over the valleys of Andorra.

13th century - Constant struggles between the counts of Foix and the Church of Urgell to undermine the rights of the bishops over Andorra.

1278 and 1288 - Signature of Pariatges between the Bishop of Urgell, Pere d'Urg, and the count of Foix, Roger Bernat III. The Pariatges establish the joint sovereignty of the Bishop of Urgell and the count of Foix over Andorra: and the Principality of Andorra is born.

- **1419** Creation of the Consell de la Terra (Council of the Land) as the first Parliamentary form with representatives from all of the parishes to deal with the problems of the community.
- **1589** Henry, King of Navarre, count of Foix, Viscount of Bearn and Lord of Andorra, becomes king of France, and unites the rights of joint Lordship of the counts of Foix with the French crown.
- **1793-1806** The French Revolution breaks the bonds between Andorra and France, but Napoleon restores the feudal tradition and the rights of joint Lordship of France over the Principality of Andorra.
- **1866** Approval of the New Reform, which brings substantial changes in the political and administrative arenas; a great sign of this was the attribution of the right to vote to all heads of households and the increased power of the General Council.
- 1933 Male universal suffrage is established.
- 1970 Female universal suffrage is established.
- **1978** Escaldes-Engordany becomes the seventh parish of Andorra thanks to its rapid economic growth connected to the use of spa waters and the increase in commercial tourism.
- **1981** Creation of the Executive Council, the Government of Andorra: the reforms begin which will culminate in the will of the people of Andorra to draw up a written constitution.
- 14th March 1993 First Constitution of Andorra, which turns the Principality into an independent democratic and social state in law, and with the new definition of competencies for the institutions. With the historical and political evolution, Andorra continues to be a co-principality, with the Bishop of Urgell and the president of the French Republic as joint princes in person and in absolute equality.
- **1993** Andorra joins the UN, which means international recognition of the country.
- **1994** Andorra joins the Council of Europe.

The Andorran relief is mountainous, with 65 peaks, some over 2000 m high, which makes Andorra one of the highest countries in Europe. The highest point in the territory is the Comapedrosa peak (2,942 m) and the lowest point is where the river Runer crosses the frontier with Spain (838 m). The average altitude is 1,996 m.

The quaternary origin of the Andorran land is revealed by the routes of the main river axes in the country: the Valira del Nord, the Valira d'Orient and the Gran Valira. These rivers are joined by other tributaries, where the main towns are located.

The lakes, mainly small and round, form part of the scenery of Andorra. Andorra has more than 70 lakes, the largest of which is the Juclar, which occupies an area of 29 ha, although other well-known lakes are Tristaina and Pessons, amongst others.

The Andorran climate is of Mediterranean mountainous type, with hot summers and cold winters and considerable snowfalls. The average minimum is -2°C and the maximum 24°C. Snowfalls are frequent and the rain is concentrated mainly in the months of October and May.

Andorran biodiversity is very rich, with more than 1,500 species of flora and fauna spread mainly in the four zones: Mediterranean, montane, sub Alpine and Alpine.

Of all the vegetable species, one stands out, the Poet's Daffodil (Narcissus poeticus), the emblematic flower of the Principality; amongst the fauna, the two most representative animals are the river trout and the chamois, which live at the highest points.

The fauna and flora of Andorra vary depending on the zone. Some of the most frequent animal species we find are: the marmot, the 'pallaresa' lizard, the squirrel, the boar and the birds of prey such as the bearded vulture. Just like the fauna, the species which form part of the country's flora are highly varied and we can find from medicinal herbs (strawberry and ilex), wild mushrooms and flowers (narcissus) to a large number of trees and bushes (hazelnut and box).

The biological wealth of Andorra justifies its preservation, and over the years different areas have been protected such as the hunting and fishing grounds and the nature parks.



The Parc Natural Comunal de les Valls del Comapedrosa nature park and the Vall de Sorteny nature park are two protected areas created with a double intention: on the one hand the ecosystems are preserved and on the other a rational use is made of them. This is a first step towards respect of the environment and the nature of the country. The Madriu-Perafita-Claror valley, declared World Heritage by Unesco in 2004 for its natural and cultural wealth, is in the south of the country and covers 10% of the territory. Given the importance of this area, it is the only valley in the country in which vehicles may not enter.

These protected areas and other valleys of the country, such as the Incles Valley, of glacial origin; the Enclar Valley, part of the Anella Verda (Green Ring) route; the Pessons cirque or the Camins dels oficis (Old trades route), offer a wide range of ecotourism trails which you can do in the company of professional guides who will help you to discover our natural heritage.

Enjoy our skiing areas all year round

If you like the snow and want to have a good time, Andorra invites you to enjoy different activities to give you new experiences with your friends, your partner or with your family. Young and old can enjoy the winter sports and a thousand and one amusements which our ski resorts offer you.

The Principality has two alpine skiing and Nordic skiing areas. Vallnord in La Massana and Ordino valleys and Grandvalira, in Canillo and Encamp valleys. Naturlandia, in La Rabassa forest in Sant Julià, offers 20 km of Nordic trails. Vallnord offers over 90 km of slopes in three sectors: Pal, Arinsal and Arcalís. Encamp, Canillo, El Tarter, Soldeu, Grau Roig and Pas de la Casa are entry points to Grandvalira – the largest skiable area in the Pyrenees with over 200 km of slopes. Both resorts offer a wide variety of activities for all ages.



If you like excitement, do not hesitate to do any of the activities they offer: jumps, mushing, snowshoe orientation, adventure activity centres for all, paragliding or helicopter flights, without forgetting the facilities for lovers of snowboarding: the Freeride Area and the Snow Park. You will also have night-time activities, such as the snowshoe excursions to enjoy the forests and the full moon.

Discover Nordic skiing and enjoy our natural surroundings on the 15 km of slopes in Naturlandia. Share your excitement with the youngest in the dog village or enjoy mushing with your friends, the snow slide, the snowshoe nature route, the snow motorcycles and quads, amongst many other activities. And if that is not enough, get on the Tobotronc, the longest alpine coaster in the world with 5.1 km, to enjoy unique sensations amidst nature.

The rest of the year, the three skiing areas in the Principality adapt to the climate and become the best stage for numerous, varied open air activities: adventure circuits and trekking, quad excursions, karts, obstacle courses, mountain biking and free flights are just some of these activities. The Vallnord Bike Park, the Grandvalira Mountain Bike Park and the Naturlandia Bike Park stand out for the number of kilometres for enjoying different mountain bike routes and levels. Furthermore, Vallnord (Arcalís sector), Naturlandia and Grandvalira (Canillo sector) offer interpretative and adventure routes for starting out in the world of orientation.

If you like trekking...

Discover the ecotourism trails on offer in the Ecotourism trails guidebook. Qualified, expert guides accompany you along the routes for you to enjoy the country's fauna and flora as much as possible. Routes of different durations and difficulties to choose the one that best adapt to your needs and discover the principal natural areas: Parc Natural Comunal de les Valls del Comapedrosa nature park, Vall de Sorteny nature park, Incles Valley, Enclar Valley, Madriu-Perafita-Claror Valley, Pessons cirque or the Old Trades Route in Sant Julià de Lòria.

If you prefer to go unaccompanied, the tourist offices will inform you of all the options available to you and you can have the Map of refuges and grand routes of Andorra, where you will find detailed descriptions of the three routes (GRP, surrounding the Principality, and GR7 and GR11, which cross the country and the two cross-border GR) and the location of the 29 high mountain refuges.

Enjoy the mountains with the iron ways, climbing, river descents...

The Principality has 16 iron ways, 8 walls and 12 climbing channels for mountain lovers to enjoy a unique experience. These sports may be practised in almost all of the parishes, and you also have different climbing or artificial walls, where it is possible to start out in climbing techniques. Another activity you can do in the country is river descents, which combines rivers with climbing and allows you to start out in the sport in a group or with your family. All of the interior or exterior routes are suitable for most people; you can feel the valley under your feet.

Enjoy golf and 'pitch & putt' in the most captivating valleys...

Andorra suggests you go into the world of golf and pitch & putt, two aspects of a fully expanding sport. Golf lovers have the Grandvalira Golf Soldeu facilities at an altitude of 2,250 m, on the highest golf course in Europe. For practitioners of pitch & putt the Valls del Nord offer the facilities of their two centres: the Golf Par 3 Vall d'Ordino and the Pitch & Putt El Torrent, in la Massana. Both beginners and experts can enjoy privileged natural surroundings, with all of the necessary services available to you from May to September.

Museums and monuments

The museums and monuments in Andorra have a well-defined common objective: the promotion of the historical and cultural heritage of the country. More than nineteen museums will bring you to the traditions and folklore of Andorra. You will discover the Andorran political structure by visiting the Casa de la Vall, the smallest Parliament in Europe. You will see the religious traditions and beliefs in the Meritxell Sanctuary, devoted to the patron saint of Andorra. Or if you visit the Farga Rossell forge, the Iron Interpretation Centre, the Perfume Museum, the Electricity Museum (MW) or the Tobacco Museum, you will experience the industrial evolution of the country with over a thousand years of history.

You will find ethnographic museums where you can travel to Andorra's past: Casa Cristo and Casa Rull home museums will show you the uses, customs and traditions of the inhabitants of the Valleys in the 19th century. You can also visit private collections such as the Motorbike Museum, where you will see the evolution of the motorcycle. In the Iconographic and Miniature Museum, you will be surprised by the representation of the Adoration of the Magi on a grain of rice, and the Escaldes-Engordany Art Centre will bring you the work of Josep Viladomat and where you will discover our Romanesque in miniature.



Romanesque art

The pre-Romanesque and Romanesque art are the artistic manifestations that have lasted longest in the Principality, while other architectural styles have been imposed in other places of Europe. The Andorran Romanesque is expressed in small buildings identified as the centre of spiritual and community life in the villages of the past, and tell us today about the formation of the parish communities and the first power relationships.

The country's Romanesque churches are characterised as small constructions with sober decoration of great beauty and harmony; there is a predominance of Lombardian decoration in the most emblematic churches in the country, which jealously guard their mural paintings inside. You will find more than 40 Romanesque churches in the most singular places of our cultural scenery.

Culture trails

The charms of each valley and their heritage are reflected in the wide range of routes offered in the country. Trails on which you will travel to Andorra's past where bishops, lords and townspeople lived in harmony. They offer you other ways to see the culture of Andorra.

We suggest the routes of the Rural Habitat and the Iron Route, and the Engolasters Hydroelectricity Trail where you will discover the forms of life of traditional Andorran society, its industry and its traditions. You will also be able to discover the most singular places of each parish through their trails: Twelve steps (Dotze petjades) on the path to Canillo, the Verdaguer Trails in Ordino, the Green Ring in Andorra la Vella, the "Old Trades Route" trail in Sant Julià de Lòria and the Granite Architecture in Escaldes-Engordany are some examples.

Visitors will discover the Principality's history, combined with visits to museums, Romanesque churches, scenic landscapes and shopping areas with the tourist bus. The routes include a tourist guide, with explanations available through an audio-guide in 4 languages (Catalan, Spanish, French and English).





Classical music, jazz, dance and theatre

Andorra offers a wide range of music, dance and theatre, promoted every year by the parish districts. Of particular note is the Colours of Music festival season in Escaldes—Engordany and the Narciso Yepes International Festival in Ordino, which takes place in autumn in the National Auditorium of Andorra. Andorra la Vella offers you the Season of music and dance, already consolidated as one of the most important activities in the country. The capital and Sant Julià de Lòria commit to theatre and from October to January and from February to June offer us the Theatre Season, which brings together renowned international actors and works in the country. This year, Canillo is organising the 3rd Comedy Theatre Season (TXR) from January to April.

In the summer months, Andorra's museums offer a selection of night-time chances to explore them from a different perspective: music, tales, astronomy, free guided tours, etc. A whole series of experiences bringing something fresh to the summer cultural selection.

Mass timetables

The most important churches in each parish offer masses every day, at weekends and during the annual religious celebrations. You will find all of the information on the mass timetables at any tourist office.

Sales

There are two periods of sales: in the winter from the end of December until the end of February, and in the summer, from the end of June to the end of August. They usually start a few days before the neighbouring countries: Spain and France.

Exemptions

You need to bear in mind excise duty when buying in Andorra. Products are tax-free up to the 900 euro limit set by customs and excise.

The gastronomy of Andorra is the legacy of the former village people who with time have received and assimilated the influences of French and Catalan cuisine. To discover its essence, you have more than 425 restaurants where you can try the traditional dishes made with the quality local products with which, combined with the tastes of modern cuisine, you will have an unforgettable experience.

Throughout the year, popular culinary meetings are also held which keep the country's gastronomy alive: The Sant Antoni and Sant Sebastià Escudellada (stew) (in January), the Sardine Feast (Sardinada) and popular Sausage meal (Botifarrada) (February), Ordino Gastronomy Fair (September), La Massana Fogons Gastronomy Days (October), The "Flavours of the World" Season (July-August) and the "Lo Mandongo" Winter Cooking Days (February) in La Massana are examples of this.



Typical dishes

The geographical location of the country has meant that it has developed its own gastronomy typical of mountain areas. Wild mushrooms, river trout, mountain trinxat (made with potatoes, cabbage, streaky bacon and garlic), game, stew, aioli, delicatessen meats (donja, bringuera, bull or bisbe sausages) and sponges are some of the specialities of Andorran gastronomy.

Tradition

Some of the signs of Andorran identity are still present in the ancient high mountain houses, the bordes, where the grain and livestock were formerly kept. Some 20 of these constructions have been transformed and set up as restaurants where you will enjoy the peculiar architecture with its warm, welcoming decoration and the traditional Andorran cuisine made with prime quality products.

For lovers of culinary art, Andorra offers stores specialised in leading gastronomic products. You can try the most exquisite snacks or find everything you need to offer your guests the best international delicacies.

Andorran gastronomy in your home...

We suggest a simple recipe for you to enjoy Andorran gastronomy from your home.

"Mountain Trinxat"

Ingredients: one green cabbage, 1.3 kg of potatoes, four cloves of garlic, four strips of streaky bacon, oil and salt.

Put the cabbage on to boil for twenty minutes. When it is ready, add the chopped potatoes. In a separate pan, fry the whole garlic. When the garlic is golden, remove it and in the same oil add the streaky bacon until it is crisp. Drain the vegetables and put them in a saucepan with the oil from the bacon and with a blender, mash it until it is all well mixed. Serve it with the bacon.


On public transport

Two regular lines connect the parishes and the main stops are on the busiest roads in the urban centres. The tickets can be bought on the bus itself. The services usually run from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m.

EXPRESS BUS: This is the fastest, most frequent line which connects the urban centres of each parish to the capital. The route crosses the country on side roads to avoid the town and village centres. The express bus is identified by its orange colour, and the stops are located in the outskirts of the towns and villages.

INTERURBAN LINES: The interurban public transport service connects all of the towns on six different lines crossing the urban centres. Each parish has a municipal transport service which connects the small villages not covered on the main routes. You will find the stops in the main streets and even uses of the urban centres.







Access to Andorra: documentation and visas

Andorra does not require visas for any nationality. However, as it is necessary to go either through Spain or France to get to Andorra, all nationals from countries not in the Schengen area must check at home whether they need a multiple entry visa to enter or leave the countries that form part of the Schengen area and be able to get to Andorra. The type of Visa will depend on the country of origin of the visitor, although the most common is usually the double or multiple entry visa. The documentation needed for entering the country will basically depend on whether the person is of legal age.

For people of legal age:

· Passport or current identity card.

For minors accompanied by parents:

- · Valid passport or current identity card
- The family record book or similar is not a valid document to travel in any instance
- · Appearing on their parents' passport

For unaccompanied minors:

 A permission to travel authorisation from their country (issued by the town hall or police station) and a valid passport or identity card

For people travelling with pets:

· A pet passport and up-to-date vaccination sheet.

All visitors suffering an accident in Andorra without a medical agreement between their country and Andorra, will have to pay for all hospital expenses and medical treatment.
